- Founded 1603

 - historic Bodleian
 - 4 Medical libraries
 - 14 Humanities libraries
 - 3 Science libraries
 - 6 Social Science libraries
 - New Special Collections Library
- 102 libraries in Oxford!



About the Bodleian (2)

- Major research collections
 - 12 million printed books
 - 30 km manuscripts and archives
 - 2 m maps
 - *c*. 1m printed music
 - c. 2m printed ephemera
 - 1+ Petabyte of digital data.

The Bodleian Libraries are looking for your help in increasing access to their music collections. Over four thousand digitised scores, mostly piano music from the nineteenth century, many of which have illustrated covers, have now been made available online. By describing these images, you will not only be helping to provide access to this valuable but hitherto 'hidden' collection, you will also be facilitating future research into popular music of the period and the wider social function which it performed during the Victorian age.

The purpose of this Zooniverse platform is purely to make the scores available for description by members of the public. For this reason, scores to be described are presented in a random order, to help ensure that the less immediately attractive scores are dealt with as well as the more exciting items. The Bodleian Libraries of the University of Oxford and the Biblioteca Apostolica Vaticana (Vatican Library) have joined efforts in a landmark digitization project with the aim of opening up their repositories of ancient texts. Over the course of the next four years, 1.5 million pages from their remarkable collections will be made freely available online to researchers and to the general public.

The initiative has been made possible by a £2 million award from the Polonsky Foundation. Dr Leonard Polonsky, who is committed to democratizing access to information, sees the increase of digital access to these two library collections — among the greatest in the world — as a significant step in sharing intellectual resources on a global scale.

Electronic Legal Deposit

- Legal Deposit is shared among 6 libraries in the UK and Eire (BL, NLS, NLW, Cambridge, Oxford, trinity College Dublin)
- Began in 1710 with Copyright Act of Queen Anne
- 2013 extended to 'non-print' publications (ie digital)
- Journals, books, music, maps, UK web
- Now in implementation phase 1 (Sept 2015).
- Shared development: costs, skills, technical infrastructure
- Based on shared goals, defined in law!

About CERL

Welcome to CERL, the Consortium of European Research Libraries. The Consortium's purpose is to share resources and expertise between research libraries with a view to improving access to, as well as exploitation and preservation of, the European printed heritage.

The Consortium was formed in 1992 on the initiative of research libraries in many European countries and legally came into being in June 1994. CERL's primary objective is to record all books printed in Europe during the hand-press period, c.1450–c.1830, in a machine-readable catalogue, called the **Heritage of the Printed Book Database** or HPB (originally called the Hand Press Book Database). Two other significant initiatives are the development of the **CERL Thesaurus** and the **CERL Portal**.

Lessons learned (1)

- Collaboration is a necessity in today's world
- Collaboration is unavoidable in a digital age
- Collaboration is costly and takes time
- Collaboration can be fun
- Collaboration is normally hard work
- Collaboration requires commitment, leadership, and Trust.

Lessons learned (2)

- Need to ensure collaboration fits strategic goals
- Need to develop staff culture to embrace collaboration
- Inevitable pressures: harmonization vs customization
 - Technical standards
 - Quality standards
 - Approaches (eg metadata)
 - Audiences
 - Business models -are they the right fit for all?
- Need to be aware of barriers to good collaboration
 - Communication
 - Time (including time differences)
 - Shared aims
- Allow enough time for good planning!

Lessons learned for NALIS (1)

- Collaboration has been a great success for NALIS
- You need to celebrate this success, and congratulate yourselves on your collective achievement
- You must make the success of NALIS visible to the people of Bulgaria, to government and politicians
- You have built up great momentum and need to keep this up.
- Look to broaden the collaboration widening the partnerships.
 - With other sectors in Bulgaria?
 - With European institutions?
 - Role of the National Library?

Lessons learned for NALIS (2)

- You have demonstrated both leadership and commitment. You need to keep this up!
- Develop a vision for the future to command support from the core group, and excite and enthuse others.
- Develop a business case for sustainability and continued growth and investment
- NALIS is national 'knowledge infrastructure' government should play a key role now in sustaining this, as it does in other parts of Europe.
- If the government is serious about education, and the knowledge economy of Bulgaria, it should invest in its academic libraries and in this key piece of knowledge infrastructure.
